Congratulations to 2013 Award Recipients

The year has passed quickly and once again it's time to honor some of those members who have contributed so much in making our chapter a success. We've had a good year: enjoyed birding opportunities and interesting programs, citizen science activities, social get-togethers, and victories in the conservation area. There will be hurdles to overcome in the future, but I'm confident that we'll rally around when the occasion for action arises. But now, let's take a look at those who are so deserving of our accolades.

The Bentley-Smith Award – Tom Reynolds

Madrone Audubon Society instituted the Bentley-Smith Award in 2002. The award is given to recognize a Madrone member for contributions to the protection and enhancement of the environment through education and/or conservation activity in the community.

This award was created in honor of Martha Bentley and Ernestine Smith, who joined the fledgling Madrone Audubon Society as charter members in 1967. As educators, Martha (through the Bird Rescue Center) and Ernie (through the Bouverie Preserve of Audubon Canyon Ranch) have reached untold numbers of children and adults. As environmental advocates they have worked tirelessly to protect wildlife & their habitats and

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improve our earth community.

Tom Reynolds took his camera and his appreciation of birds and all wildlife into his retirement, benefiting Madrone Audubon and overall conservation efforts in Sonoma County. His exceptional county-wide photography reminds us every single day of the very special places around us - on our coast, in our parks, and in our open spaces. His photos are much appreciated by the Regional Parks Department to boost local support for the parks; his photos have been used in the Madrone Leaves and on our website. Though photography is his passion, he's quick to lend a hand as needed for other projects, including a heron/egret slide presentation for students at the Lincoln School Festival activities.

Bewick's Wren Award – Bob Speckels

This is the oldest of the four Madrone awards and recognizes a member for a long-term, exceptional contribution. The Bewick's Wren, Madrone's logo, was selected in 1967, and Les Bowen designed the original insignia. This year's award recognizes Bob Speckels who served as President and Vice President of Madrone for four years, from 2008 to 2012. He was one of the organizers of the twice-amonth Saturday Beginning Bird Walks for four years, and he has done bird censuses in the spring months both at the Modini-Ingalls Environmental Preserve since 2010 and at the Mayacamas Sanctuary. In the fall of 2010, he plunged in to be a co-leader for the current five-year

Cliff Swallows Die in Petaluma, What We Intend to Do About It, and How You Can Help

The nearby Petaluma Wetlands and river bank – with mud for nests and high numbers of insects for nutrition – make the Petaluma River Bridge and Lakeville Highway Overpass Bridge an established return nesting site for migratory Cliff Swallows. Just as the Capistrano Swallows return to nest in Capistrano each year, the Petaluma Cliff Swallows migrate from South America to Petaluma in March to begin making nests, raise their young, and then return to South America 6000 miles away for the winter.

This would be another incredible story of nature in Sonoma County and a great opportunity to observe this natural

2013 Feather Fest for Kids: Birds, Eggs, & Nests!

PWA held its first ever Feather Fest for Kids on Sunday April 7th at Shollenberger Park and what a great day it was! It was designed for kids ages 6-12 and their parents as a requested follow-up activity to the annual Christmas Bird Count for Kids. Fifty-one people participated in the event, including 21 kids, 19 relatives, and 11 docents. The weather was pleasant and the birds were displaying their nesting behavior for all to enjoy. A special kid-friendly tailgate lunch was provided at the end of the walk. Pitching in to help with the lunch setup was Madrone President, Susan Kirks.

Four teams of kids and family members were formed; they named themselves the Avocets, Loons, Eagles, and Hawks. The teams toured the wetlands and were led by PWA docents Andy LaCasse, Elaine Pruett, Peter Colasanti, Lisa Shiffrin, Wayne Till, JJ Harris, Gerald Moore, and Mary Edith Moore. The kids observed nesting behaviors of several bird species, including Canada Geese, American Avocets,

Mallards, Northern Shovelers, American Coots, Tree Swallows, Red-winged Blackbirds, Killdeer, Cinnamon Teals, Green Herons, Black-necked Stilts, Marsh Wrens, and Bushtits.

Following the walk, the teams met at the Shollenberger Park picnic tables for a lunch of hot dogs, chips, sodas, cookies, and oranges. During lunch, each family was presented with a children's illustrated book, *Take-Along Guide: Birds, Nests and Eggs*, by Mel Boring, compliments of the Petaluma Wetlands Alliance, a committee of the Madrone Audubon.

Future kids' events will be planned in the Petaluma Wetlands for the continued enjoyment and appreciation of our natural world.

Lincoln School Bird Festival

This annual festival celebrated May 1 was a big success, thanks to the time and energy of a few dozen volunteers. This event, which is organized by retired Lincoln School Elementary teacher Kathie Noguchi and Madrone members Janet Bosshard, Marcia

Johnson, and Janeann Erickson, is designed to teach the students and staff of the school about the wonders of the bird world. For most of the students the highlight of the day is viewing the herons and egrets nesting in the rookery a short walk from their school. They are able to get a close-up view of the birds' nests, thanks to the efforts of Emiko Condeso and Sarah Millus, biologists with Audubon Canyon Ranch. Emiko and Sarah bring their knowledge (and extra spotting scopes); everybody gets a good look at the birds on the nests.

There were also storytelling sessions with Ane Rovetta and visits by two resident educational birds from the Bird Rescue Center. Both the Turkey Vulture and the Barn Owl were a big hit. The day also included classroom art projects, games, and a session on bird beaks led by Marcia Johnson and docents from the Laguna Foundation. Tom Reynolds also visited the school before Bird Day and gave slide presentations of local birds.

Sonoma County Breeding Bird Atlas project, a revision of the original 1995 Breeding Bird Atlas of the entire county.

His dedicated work has fulfilled the criteria for the Bewick's Award: "exceptional service, vital to our chapter's activity over a long period of time."

The Evalyn and Les Bowen Award – Scott Campbell

The Bowen award was established in 1988 and is named after two people who were very influential in the founding of our chapter. In August 1965, the Bowens moved to Santa Rosa from San Diego and began joining groups to meet people so that they could begin an Audubon chapter here. The story goes that Evalyn "cornered people buying seed in stores and anyone who might even be remotely interested in birds." Gradually 42 birders were corralled, and Madrone Audubon came into existence. The first organizational meeting was held in January 1967. In March 1967, Madrone became the 23rd chapter of Audubon California, and the Bowens hosted the meetings in their home for the next few years. Evalyn became the first president, and she and Les led many of the field trips.

The Bowens would be pleased that this award be given to Scott Campbell whose nature education and working with children has been a long-time focus of Madrone Audubon. Madrone started a PeeWee activity program in 1984 for children with their parents; eventually the PeeWee program evolved into Junior Audubon. In November 2011 Scott coordinated Madrone's Junior Audubon activities and brought that program back to life with new places to go, see, and do.

Scott moved from Chico to Santa Rosa to work with the elderly and balances his work with "youth, where his heart is."

Burridge Award - Sarah Millus

The Burridge award was established in

2008 by Diane and Bryant Hichwa to recognize those who contribute to research and education.

Sarah Millus is Helen Pratt Field Biologist at Audubon Canyon Ranch (ACR). Sarah monitors and tracks the progress of herons and egrets nesting at the Martin Griffin Preserve and at other heronries throughout the northern San Francisco Bay Area. Her work adds to more than 40 years of heron and egret observations collected by ACR. Sarah has assisted Madrone members monitoring herons, and she regularly does the counting and tracking of the West 9th Street colony in Santa Rosa. She helps nearby Lincoln Elementary School students at Madrone's yearly Bird Festival learn about "their" herons and egrets.

Special Recognition - Steve Brady

Steve Brady is an Environmental Specialist with City of Santa Rosa. He has coordinated efforts among City Departments, including Public Works, Parks & Recreation and Administration, for the West 9th Street nesting site. This year he has helped to see that additional signage ("Birds Nesting in Area") is installed at the site, and he has supported Madrone Audubon in efforts to give more protection to these amazing birds in their chosen traffic-prone area. His untiring and selfless dedication to environmental issues in Santa Rosa helps neighborhoods with special wildlife issues, keeping the city an interesting and educational place to live and work.

Special Recognition - Steve Jette

Petaluma Wetlands Alliance docent Steve Jette has had a passion for the Petaluma River and its tributaries for decades. Last September Steve put together a work crew of some homeless men and, with assistance from the Petaluma Public Works Department and the Sonoma County Water Agency, was able to bring a wetlands trail and creek "back to life." Starting by the Petaluma Outlet Mall they unearthed the trail and creek hidden by weeds, blackberries, trash, and old cars... then continued cleaning for two miles downriver. This is

a fine example of one man's determined effort to cleanup a beautiful river. PWA is very proud of what Steve has accomplished and hopes to help him this summer to remove the invasive blackberries that will return to the cleared trails during their growing season.

phenomenon if the other part of the story were not horrifying and true: Cliff Swallows arriving in Petaluma this year were met with sloppy and inadequate exclusion netting which Caltrans' contract workers had installed under both bridges. The installation was claimed to be part of the Highway 101 Marin Narrows Widening Project, requiring a work distance of 50 feet from active nests. However, the ground work below the Petaluma River Bridge was over 100 feet away, far from the nests. No one at Caltrans or their contractor will explain why this netting was installed in the first place or why netting only portions of the bridge would effectively work to exclude nesting.

Cliff Swallows and other birds, including White-Throated Swift, House Finch, and Starling, became entangled in the netting. Large numbers of Cliff Swallows naturally swarmed and approached their nesting site and were left hanging there, entrapped, to suffer and die. Veronica Bowers discovered the ongoing tragedy when she noticed the birds entrapped in netting as she drove into Petaluma on April 7th. She immediately contacted Caltrans, with no response. Repeated calls to US Fish and Wildlife Service and the CA Department of Fish and Wildlife went unanswered. Veronica and volunteers from Native Songbird Care and Conservation, as well as Madrone Audubon,

returned to the bridge to document this unfolding and ongoing tragedy and demand action to stop it.

On April 10th, the project manager for the contractor, CC Myers, told an observer they had been aware of the "problem" for three weeks and had removed many dead and dying birds from the nets. Maggie Rufo, a dedicated conservationist and wildlife rehabilitation volunteer, started a petition on www.change.org which has over 6,300 signatures as we go to press. Lisa Shiffrin, Madrone's Membership Chair, sent an email to Madrone members to inform them of this ongoing tragedy and ask them to contact those responsible to REMOVE THE NETTING and STOP THE KILLING.

In spite of the netting challenges put in their way by Caltrans, the swallows were able to build about 200 nests, collectively located on the two bridges. Cliff Swallows are also trying to construct nests ON the netting, the attempted netting repairs made by Caltrans, and on scaffolding installed on the Petaluma River Bridge. This scaffolding was apparently designed to enable Caltrans workers to reach the netted areas by lifts, climb onto the scaffolding, cut the dead birds out of the netting, and then destroy partially completed nests to reduce nesting. The entire scene is like seeing a bad, bad comedy of errors. Many swallows continued to die. Since April 7th when Veronica Bowers first discovered entrapped and dying birds, she personally documented 104 Cliff Swallows who lost their lives because of this incompetence and arrogance.

In early April Madrone Audubon retained the firm Lippe Gaffney Wagner LLP in San Francisco to explore potential legal violations and actions to remove the netting from both bridges, stop the killing, and hold responsible parties accountable. Animal Legal Defense Fund, a national animal advocacy group based in Cotati, also began to take action, sending a demand letter to Caltrans. Madrone's attorney, Brian Gaff-

ney, prepared excellent violation letters, insisting the netting be removed and demanding a response by May 1 about violations of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act and State and Federal Environmental law. Federal and state agencies were slow to respond, saying they needed more time.

A phone conference call arranged by California Assembly Member Marc Levine's office with Caltrans, US Fish and Wildlife, CA Dept of Fish and Wildlife, Veronica Bowers, and Madrone's attorney listening silently occurred on May 2nd. It was not a fruitful phone call, with Caltrans not accepting responsibility, saying "with nets, always gonna have some death," and claiming they netted the bridges (100 feet above ground construction under the Petaluma River Bridge) to meet their requirement of staying 50 feet away from nests while doing construction. Caltrans claimed they were going to be installing new columns for the new Petaluma River Bridge in July and nesting birds with eggs would stop them. They failed to acknowledge the complete failure of the netting and the fact that multiple nests are established on both bridges outside the netting areas.

Both Animal Legal Defense Fund and Lippe Gaffney Wagner began preparing for lawsuits to address legal violations. Native Songbird Conservation and Care, Animal Legal Defense Fund, Madrone Audubon, Center for Biological Diversity, Marin Audubon, and Golden Gate Audubon coalesced to consider litigation under the auspices of Animal Legal Defense Fund with Meyer Glitzenstein & Crystal, a Washington, D.C. based public interest law firm. This agreement occurred on May 9th. We also believe the US Fish and Wildlife Service should prosecute for the Migratory Bird Treaty Act violations, and we want to work with California legislators to pass legislation, prohibiting use of netting for exclusion under bridges.

What we have witnessed should never have happened – should be stopped – and should never occur again. This is why we are in litigation, representing our Madrone Audubon membership to the best of our ability and supporting the dedicated work of songbird expert Veronica Bowers.

The Cliff Swallows migrate from South America to the Petaluma River Bridge and Lakeville Highway Overpass Bridge to build their nests. They help control our insect populations naturally and raise their young, before migrating back to South American for the winter. These migratory swallows did not deserve this treatment by Caltrans and its employees.

Demand the netting under the Petaluma River Bridge and Lakeville Highway Overpass Bridge be removed immediately AND demand that those responsible for killing the migratory Cliff Swallows be held accountable.
- 3. Consider sending a donation to help our coalition's effort in litigation. Mail your check of support to Madrone Audubon, PO Box 1911, Santa Rosa, CA 95402 designate "Cliff Swallows" on your check memo line. We will add your support to our coalition's intention and effort.



Madrone Bird-A-Thon 2013 Results Are In!

A grand total of \$9,323.00 was raised to support Madrone's educational and environmental projects. Thanks to all the teams and sponsors.

Strangely, several Virginia Rails answered the calls from Diane's cell phone at the little ponds at Highway 116 and Highway 1. At the Laguna, a Wilson's Snipe, Long-billed Curlews, and Cattle Egrets were seen.

Canada Geese, Wild Turkeys, and Eurasian Collard Doves showed up in numerous places. A Scrub Jay flew by carrying a stick for its nest. Orange-crowned Warblers and Hutton's Vireos sang repeat performances. And a White-tailed Kite caught a mouse to bring back to his mate.

At Shollenberger, Avocets in breeding plumage, Black-necked Stilts, and nearby 20 Ring-necked Ducks made for a great day. Birding is ALWAYS a treat!

The Gray-headed Seersuckers with Ken Wilson, Becky Olsen, and Ian Morrison picked March 10th as the perfect day for weather and birdwatching. They traipsed around the county searching every bush, tree, and clump of grass in search of species. Starting at 7:00 AM at Spring Lake, a pair of Bushtits was seen building their nest and a large group of Common Mergansers flew into the lake...only two of the 60+ species seen at Spring Lake.

Bodega Bay was the next stop, after finding a pair of Hooded Mergansers and a flock of approximately 28 Long-billed Curlews at the Laguna in Sebastopol, with no Bald Eagles in sight! Bodega Bay and Harbor were productive, although the Rock Sandpiper was not present. Diekmann's Store included Wilson's, Nashville, and Orange-crowned Warblers. A group of over 150 Cackling Geese flying southward over the harbor raised some questions about leadership. The day ended at Shollenberger Park at 5:30 PM, where Black-necked Stilt and American Avocet were added. This team totaled 132 species. Though there were no surprises or unusual sightings, every bird was lovely to see.

cous-winged cross Gull at Lucchesi Park. The odd collection of Cackling Geese is still present at Ellis Creek. This team ended up with 144 birds.

Gene started at Owl Canyon at 6:55 AM (nothing much there), hiked to Campbell Cove, up the road to Bodega Head. He spotted a group of British birders scoping the Rock Sandpiper (a bird present since Christmas). In his hurry to continue, he missed the Surfbirds! At the Marine Lab, the Burrowing Owl was hiding, but the only White-tailed Kite of the day was seen on the high point. Hiking down to the Westside Campground area, Spud Point to the Rail Ponds, Ruddy Turnstone, Whimbrel, and a few Western Sandpipers were found. Later seen were Marbled Godwits, Willets, Sanderlings, and Dunlins.

At the Rail Ponds, Gene managed to pish up a Hermit Thrush and a sleeping Clark's Grebe. He then hiked over the dunes to Salmon Creek, where gull numbers were low, though Herring, Thayer's among others were seen. Hiking south of Salmon Creek Bridge, a Northern Harrier and a Merlin cruised by. On to Porto Bodega and Diekmann's Store which were basically quiet. While eating a pizza from Diekmann's, a likely female

Peregrine screamed overhead, striking an unwary Bufflehead. While enjoying her meal, a kleptoparasitic Turkey Vulture swooped down and stole the Peregrine's lunch. The enraged falcon spent 15 minutes strafing the vulture before giving it up as lost.

Walking south to Doran Spit and on to the outer beach with a cold wind blowing, a couple of Snowy Plovers, a Red-necked Grebe, and a female Harlequin Duck were seen amongst loons and scoters. As no dabbling ducks had been found as the sun was setting beneath the clouds, a flock of American Wigeons, a couple of Gadwalls and Green-winged Teals were welcome. Considering that Gene walked approximately 15 miles for about a 12-hour day, 91 species is very impressive!
